Holy habits



SBC DINNER RESPONSE SUMMARY 2024

Concerns about disaffiliation

(14 table responses)

- No concerns (9)
- Retirement accounts for pastors managed by SBC (3)
- Ability to continue supporting Annie Armstrong, Lottie Moon, Heck-Jones, etc. (2)
- FBC Clayton could possibly be viewed as moderate/liberal by outsiders who hear about the decision to disaffiliate from the SBC (1)
- Process of disaffiliation could result in a church split (1)

Concerns about remaining affiliated with the SBC

(14 table responses)

- Loss of autonomy (8)
- That SBC would continue to exercise more control/influence over member churches
 (i.e. "What will be paper payt?") (2)

(i.e., "What will happen next?") (3)

- Effect on church staff---potential loss of staff and/or effect on staff morale/attitude (3)
- Sends mixed message regarding our support of female pastors (i.e., we say that we support ordaining/employing female pastors which would be in contradiction with SBC constitutional amendment.) (2)
- Would result in uncertainty/uneasiness among congregation (1)
- Sends mixed message to visitors/new members and potential senior pastor candidates (1)
- No concerns with remaining affiliated (1)

<u>Feelings regarding being a church that is</u> <u>"Not in friendly cooperation with SBC" (N.I.F.C.)</u> <u>if amendment passes and we remain with SBC</u>

(14 table responses)

- View it as a negative/unfavorable to be a church that is N.I.F.C. (9)
- Would be concerned about SBC eventually disfellowshipping us if we remained affiliated and classified as being N.I.F.C. (1)
- Would like a better definition of what is meant by N.I.F.C. (1)
- Would not want to be affiliated with any organization that doesn't share our beliefs regarding female pastors (1)
- No concern with being labeled as N.I.F.C. (1)

Meaning of "Autonomous" and its importance

(14 table responses)

- It means that we follow the Bible in making decisions for our church, and we have the freedom to govern ourselves without another organization dictating what we believe/how we operate (12)
- It is a basic tenet of our Baptist faith/heritage (1)
- 9 tables indicated it as being important or very important

Value of autonomy vs. value of denominational affiliations

(14 table responses)

- Autonomy is more important than our denominational affiliations (12)
- We should align with denominational organizations that prioritize autonomy of the local church (1)
- If we base our autonomy on what God wants, then denominational affiliation should not matter (1)
- What is the benefit of denominational affiliation? (1)
