Jesus calls us to radical obedience

One of the more curious participants in the Palm Sunday account is the man who loaned his colt for the parade. Think about it. If you had a brand-new car parked in your driveway, one you had not taken on a maiden voyage around the block, and a couple of strangers suddenly were sitting in the front seat claiming that the master needed a ride, would you toss them the keys? I admit, given as little information as the scripture provides, I'd have a few second thoughts.

Jesus calls us to radical obedience. Everything we own becomes his. Everything we have accomplished for ourselves becomes obsolete and ineffective compared to what he offers us. As we watch Jesus during Holy Week, we reach out to him to show us the way. Considering his commitment to God's will, we recommit ourselves to him knowing we cannot do this on our own. We need to let Jesus do his best work in us.

Palm Sunday is a reminder that the reign of Christ is not like that of any earthly authority. In the wilderness, when he was tempted by Satan, Jesus could have chosen to be like the high priest, like Pilate, or King Herod. Instead, he chose to be the one who arrived on the colt of a donkey. He chose to usher in a new reality. He exercised the power of humility, grace, and love. Jesus broke the hold Evil has on the world not by political or military might, but by submission; through faith that God had a better way to lead us to the peace we seek. Palm Sunday begins a weeklong glimpse into the Passion of Christ. His work affirms that wonderful passage in Isaiah 55:8, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the LORD." Who in Jerusalem that Sunday would have believed what the next week would bring?

This week we will celebrate that Jesus gave his all for us. Considering his sacrifice we ask, what are we willing to give up for him? For others? What are we holding on to for dear life – that when it comes to our relationship with Jesus – ends ups getting in the way? This is not just an assessment of physical things, but of spiritual things too. The man who loaned his colt reminds us that we have too tight a hold on material things. Jesus' example shows us we have deeper work to do. We must confront the hurts we have accumulated, the pride we nurture, our own self-righteousness if we are to fully submit

to him. We must forgive as he has forgiven, trust as he trusted, and love others as he has loved us if we are to truly experience resurrection.

This Holy Week reminds us that we still have work to do. The Lord is passing by. He needs all that we are holding on to. Will we let him take what holds us back with him to the cross?


