Which way?

My previous article (February 11) on discipleship ended with a question: "How might we become counter-cultural enough to truly follow Jesus and make disciples who (in turn) make more disciples?"

I think the answer is short, but it falls into the category of one of those "good news, bad news" things. The good news is the answer is simple. The bad news is the answer is not easy. This answer is "repent," but this may sound odd to your ear.

The Gospels tell us that when Jesus began his ministry, He proclaimed, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." (Matthew 4:17, Mark 1:14-15)

The Greek word translated "repent" literally means to change the way we think. Perhaps a better way to say it is to "see things in a different way." We have been taught that to repent means to see our *sin* as God sees it and to become remorseful to the point that we change our minds (and our actions) about it. This is true, but the idea of repentance is deeper than just dealing with sin. True repentance (which the Bible teaches must come from God) causes something more profound to happen: to cause us to look at *everything* the way God sees it. Put another way, repentance is to align *our thinking* with God's will as given to us in the Bible. Our thoughts lead us to our behavior and to quote a popular writer: "True biblical repentance will always result in a change of behavior. Maybe not instantly, but inevitably and progressively."*

We also tend to think of repentance in an individual, personal context, but community repentance is clearly in view when we read the Lord's last words to the local churches in Revelation 2 and 3.

On the eve of his crucifixion, as Jesus was comforting his disciples, he told them that to love him meant to follow him in obedience (John 14:15, 23-24). So this "how" of making disciples must begin with true Biblical repentance followed by loving obedience to his teaching.

Simple, but not easy. And this is certainly true in the 21st Century. How might we become counter-cultural enough to truly follow Jesus and make disciples who (in turn)
