I am loving the fruit of my earlier labors in the garden. Already this month Cathy has made me two tomato pies and I am anticipating another this evening. Our basil is growing tall. Our lettuce continues to grow. We discovered a new way to marinate cucumbers. Although I did not plant any this year, zucchini is plentiful and easy to find.

Two new recipes from Southern Living are quickly becoming favorites, one calls for sautéed zucchini mixed with pasta and an Alfredo sauce, the other mixes zucchini and corn in a skillet with parmesan cheese and Italian seasoning. Bottom line, these are not my momma's ways of eating summer vegetables!

Of course, every now and then I stew squash with onions and eat sliced tomatoes on a sandwich with bacon and lettuce. I have not completely forgotten where I come from. I still crave fried cornbread and those other summer delicacies from my childhood. I'm just thankful that with the abundance of vegetables this year, I have discovered other ways to enjoy them. The point I'm trying to make is that it is good when we learn new ways to follow Christ. It is good when we learn that there is more to Bible study than just reading a Sunday school lesson on Saturday night. As we mature in faith we collect 'new recipes'




2024 Mid-Year Report from Budget and Finance


Good news! First Baptist Church Clayton has met its General Fund budget for the first six months of 2024. General Fund giving (January 1 - June 30) totaled \$383,099. The church budgeted \$383,075 so actual giving exceeded budgeted giving by \$24.

Gifts to the General Fund exceeded actual expenses by \$76,856, which leaves

us in a comfortable financial position. It must be noted, however, the surplus is primarily the result of the absence of a full-time Senior Pastor. The 2024 Budget included line items for a Senior Pastor's salary, housing, insurance, retirement and mileage. These budgeted funds, of course, have not been spent.

Nonetheless, please know there is still work to be done. Giving is lagging behind the budget this month. Our weekly needs are \$14,860. Thus far in July, weekly General Fund giving has averaged \$11,719.
