What does membership mean? Part 2

Last week we began a short series on what it means to be a member of the Church. We talked about how when someone gives their life to Jesus as their Lord and Savior several things occur simultaneously. Our sins are forgiven, the Holy Spirit comes to reside in our heart helping us to discern and grow as believers, and we become a part of Jesus' body – Church.



We cannot be Christian apart from Jesus and the Church is Jesus' Body on earth. Today I want to explore why it is important to be a member of a local congregation.

First, it is important because we all need a place to grow and be nurtured in faith. We need a place where we are loved and accepted and where we can practice loving and accepting others. In short, we need a place to be fed, a place where we commit to belonging so that we can help others as we are helped by them (See Romans 1:12, it is a favorite

verse of mine).

As believers we cannot grow into deeper faith in a vacuum. Being a part of a church (notice the lower case "c") is identifying with other believers you want to grow deeper in faith with.

Here is a story I once heard about Dwight Moody, a famous preacher from the last century. It seems that one night a man from his church visited Dr. Moody and said he didn't believe it was necessary to belong to a local church, he'd rather just visit different places and not get involved in one place.

As the man talked, Dr. Moody quietly reached for the iron to stir the fire they were sitting next to. He took the iron and slowly pulled one ember away from the flame letting it rest on the hearth where it went from bright red and smoking to black as it lost its heat and cooled being away from the roaring flames. Wisely, Dr. Moody didn't say anything but let the conversation drift from one subject to another letting his visitor conclude that he had won the argument.

Then, a bit later as the man was about to leave, Dr. Moody returned to the subject. "You see this coal? When it was a part of the fire it was hot and gave warmth. But now, having been separated from the fire, it has lost its heat. It has grown cold no longer being in the fireplace."

With that Dr. Moody stooped down and took the coal in his hand and offered it to his visitor. "That is what happens to the Christian who separates themselves from the church. We must remain in the fire if we want to be a part of the work of Christ."

Identifying with a local congregation is committing to remain in the fire where the Holy Spirit warms us so that we can participate in helping to warm others. We need each other to grow as believers, and others need to know we are going to be there with them so that they can grow too. The more we are together, the more we experience the warmth of relationships. The more we are together, the more we experience the fire of the Holy Spirit.

Next week we will talk about how being a member of a church is practicing spiritual discipline. My prayer is that everyone will know how important we are to one another, and that if anyone feels their faith is cooling, they will risk getting closer to the flames.
