Finale: What does membership mean?

Perhaps the correct heading for this article should be "How do I unite with the church?" Notice I didn't say join or become a member. As we have said, membership and joining are not like with other things.

So many of the words we use have many meanings. The word 'love' comes to mind. I love the Lord my God and I love my first sip of coffee in the morning. Same word, completely different meaning. So, today I will say unite rather than join because I think that is a better word for what membership means.

As a refresher, when we unite with a church, we are first making a public statement of faith that Jesus Christ is the risen Son of God. Our public acknowledgement is testimony to others that we share commit-



ment to Jesus and want to serve alongside others who are working to honor Christ. Matthew 10:32-33 comes to mind, "Everyone, therefore, who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven, but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven."

Identifying ourselves as believers is not a once in a lifetime thing; it is a daily exercise of growing in faith.

Secondly, when we unite with a church, we are both sharing our gifts with the local congregation and stating we need the gifts of others to serve Jesus more fully. God did not create us to be in isolation but to be in community. In the second chapter of Genesis, (v.18) the Bible tells us, "The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner."

And while we see this as God's plan that Adam and Eve would complement each other, it also indicates that all of humanity is created to help one another and be in community. When we unite with a church we become a part of God's family in this world.

As Baptists we believe that every person is competent and free to make their own decisions regarding faith. For this reason, at the end of our worship service we offer a hymn

Volunteers sought for hurricane recovery trip

First Baptist Clayton will team up with N.C. Baptist Men Disaster Relief to help Hurricane Helene victims in the Swannanoa area. Men and women, age 18 and older, are encouraged to volunteer. The mission trip is Sunday, March 30 through Friday, April 4.

The construction and repair work will consist of installing insulation, hanging sheetrock, and plumbing and electrical jobs. You do not have to be skilled at any of this work to help. Just come and do whatever you can. The homeowners will most likely be on site and you will have the opportunity to witness to them.

The team from Clayton will sleep in the Swannanoa Baptist Church. Bring a cot or blowup mattress, and sheets, blankets or sleeping bag. There will be a shower trailer at the church. All volunteers will be pro-



vided three meals per day.

We will gather in the First Baptist parking lot at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday, March 30. Rev. Keeley Tarkington will commission the group and pray for safe travels. We will pull out at 9 a.m. After five days of work, discipleship and fellowship, the First Baptist

team will depart for home at 9 a.m. on Friday, April 4.

If you commit to this effort please make sure it is a firm commitment. Sign-up sheets are located in the side vestibules. An information packet will be available Sunday, March 9. We may take one of the church buses. Prayerfully consider joining us on this relief effort to assist our neighbors in the mountains. of invitation where people are given the chance to respond by coming down to unite with the church. If you are making a first-time profession of faith, or if you are coming from another expression of Christianity, the next step is baptism. As Baptists, we affirm a believer's baptism.

This is very important to us as we participate in the death and resurrection of Jesus in the baptistry. Every Baptist believer has taken this step. It is both testimony and an affirming memory for us.

We die to the old life and are raised into new life. If you have never had this experience, we will be talking more about it as you prepare for baptism.

If you have already been immersed in baptism, we will contact your former church and let them know that you are united with us. If a former church did not keep records of baptism or one does not know how to get in touch with them, we accept new members on a statement of faith.

Finally, in those rare occasions someone wants to unite with us but also remain on the roll of another church, they can come under the watch care of the church where their membership remains elsewhere while they identify and join in ministry at First Baptist.
