Meditation on the Lord's Prayer #2

"Our Father, which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name."

In the movie Field of Dreams, Kevin Costner's character Ray is asked, "Is this heaven?" to which he replies, "No, this is Iowa." Truthfully, we don't know where heaven is located. Heaven is beyond us, and at the same time so close that God can hear our thoughts and

knows our needs. What we know is that heaven is the place where God dwells in fullness



Heaven is the place we envision when we read John 14:1-3, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also." Heaven is the ground of

our future hope.

Heaven is where God's perfection resides in all God's glory. It is the place depicted in Revelation where God is forever worshipped and adored. It is the place where those who belong to God will dwell in peace for all eternity. It is the place prepared for us where we will be with Christ Jesus.

When we pray to "Our Father in heaven," we are addressing the Most Holy who created heaven and earth. It is the place where all things purposefully came into existence by God's creative will.

Our prayers pierce time and space. Our prayers are heard by God who at the very same time is there and here, transcendent and omnipresent.

What a privilege that we can pray. What a gift that God created prayer so that we may commune with God personally and corporately, in voice and silence; that our words would be joyfully received, that our hearts would hear the Creator's response.

It is a mystery to me that my prayers go beyond all known reality into the place where God in all God's infinite glory takes time to listen to my meager offering of words; treating them as a treasure the way a grandparent displays a grandchild's artwork on their refrigerator.

As the writer penned, "What a privilege it is to carry, everything to God in prayer."

Deadline to sign up for the Hurricane Helene mission trip to the mountains is this Sunday

This Sunday, March 23, is the last day you can sign up to go with the First Baptist team on a mission trip to Swannanoa to assist Hurricane Helene victims.

Volunteers from our church will join with the Baptists on Missions Disaster Response team. Men and women, age 18 and older are encouraged to volu-

and older, are encouraged to volunteer. The mission trip is Sunday, March 30 through Friday, April 4.

The construction and repair work will consist of installing insulation, hanging sheetrock, and plumbing and electrical jobs. You do not have to be skilled at any of this work to help. Just come and do whatever you can. The homeowners will most likely be on site and you will have the opportunity to witness to them.

The team from Clayton will sleep in the Swannanoa Baptist Church. Bring a cot or blowup mattress, and sheets, blankets



or sleeping bag. There will be a shower trailer at the church. All volunteers will be provided three meals per day.

We will gather in the church parking lot at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday, March 30. Rev. Keeley Tarkington will commission the group and pray for safe travels. We will

pull out at 9 a.m. After five days of work, discipleship and fellowship, the First Baptist team will depart for home at 9 a.m. on Friday, April 4. If you commit to this effort please make sure it is a firm commitment.

Sign-up sheets are located in the side vestibules. An information packet will be available Sunday, March 9. We may take one of the church buses. Prayerfully consider joining us on this relief effort to assist our neighbors in the mountains.
