Meditation on the Lord's Prayer #4

The first hint that "Give us this day our daily bread" is more than about garlic knots and cinnamon toast is where it falls

in the Lord's Prayer. If we move past it too quickly, we may miss the deeper meaning of this sentence. Certainly, Jesus is speaking in the literal sense of daily bread, but there is more here than meets the eye.



To go deeper we must peel the onion to discover the richness of this petition. In Jesus' day daily bread was critical for survival. Food insecurity isn't something that is unique to our time and culture. Just as the Children of Israel depended on God to provide Manna in the desert, so those in the 1st century looked to God for daily sustenance.

Several passages come to mind that highlight this. First, Jesus spoke of depending on God when he taught his disciples not to worry about food or drink in Matthew 6:25 and following. Then there is the daily distribution of food mentioned in Acts 6.

Rest assured; Jesus' prayer includes the

literal need for daily bread. He wanted those who prayed to recognize that God is the one who feeds them. And.... there is more.

When the woman at the well asked Jesus for living water (John 7) she was thinking H2O, but he was thinking something much more spiritual. Jesus offered her something that would revive her heart and provide her something much more critical.

He was concerned about her salvation. She was thirsty for water. He was offering something that would bathe her heart in cooling grace.

In our petition for daily bread there is a deeper meaning. Jesus is the bread of life. In John 6:35 he says, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." When we pray for daily bread, we are both asking for food to eat and spiritually for Jesus to sustain us.

We need forgiveness daily. We need guidance daily. We need the wisdom of the Holy Spirit daily. To live as a believer, we need spiritual food to lead us and guide us. We need daily insights, reminders of God's work being accomplished around us.

When we ask God for our daily bread, we are asking for our bodies and our spiritual

Vote on organ project postponed

The proposed motion by the Music Council asking the church to raise an additional \$422,000 plus building renovation costs to fund the refurbishment and installation of an organ gift by Seventh Street Christian Church at the April 9 business meeting has been postponed.

Rev. Keeley Tarkington, Minister of Music, said the Richmond church sale has been delayed which is giving our church more time to determine a path forward and decide if we want to accept the gift. Many questions regarding the organ and renovation to the sanctuary arose after a plan was presented to the church following the March 23 worship service.

The revised organ project will be brought before the church in mid to late May and perhaps as late as the fall. The additional time will allow the Music Council to acquire competitive bids from three organ companies for refurbishment and installation, and to consult with architects, engineers, and contractors to ascertain exactly the cost of necessary renovations to the sanctuary.

Bill and Ernestine O'Neal established the Organ Fund in 1997. Over the years, many church members and friends of First Baptist have donated to this fund with the sole purpose to purchase a new organ. The Music Council feels strongly that these funds should honor the wishes of donors, past and present. The Organ Fund continues to grow with gifts coming in frequently.

"I, on behalf of the Music Council, appreciate your thoughtful prayers, questions and support during this fluid process," said Rev. Tarkington. "We have an amazing opportunity in this gift being offered by Seventh Street Christian. It is our desire that as we continue to work through this process, God will make clear for us the best path forward. Thank you for your collaboration in helping answer those prayers."
