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#5 - Forgive those who trespass

In the 10 Commandments, the first commandment with a promise is, "Honor your father and mother so that your days may

be long in the land the Lord your God is giving you." This commandment teaches responsibility and promotes accountability.

God wants the Children of Israel to understand that they have a

part to play in assuring their relationship with God continues. When we practice honoring our parents, we are naturally learning how to honor God.

Likewise, the line in the Lord's Prayer to "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us" has a reciprocal element to it. Following the prayer in Matthew 5:14, Jesus teaches, "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if you do not forgive others, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses."

Do you remember the parable of the man who owed his king ten thousand talents (see Matthew 18:23-35)? The king called the man into his presence and demanded



that he repay the money he owed or everything in his possession, including his wife and children, would be sold to repay the debt. The man fell on his face and begged for mercy and having compassion on the fellow, the king forgave the debt.

But leaving the palace, he saw another person who owed him one hundred denarii and instead of being merciful as the king had been to him, he had the man bound and thrown into prison until the debt was repaid. Hearing about this the king was furious and reversed his order. He said, "I had mercy on you, shouldn't you then have mercy on your fellow slave?"

Our being forgiven, being offered God's grace, is directly related to how willing we are to do for others as Christ has done for us. In Romans 12:14, Paul addresses this when he pens, "Bless those who persecute you, bless and do not curse them." In verse 21 he concludes, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

As believers, we are to be examples of grace and mercy. In this, we are modeling what Jesus did for us when he "emptied himself, taking on the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death – even death

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on a cross" (Philemon 2:7-8).

It is appropriate that as we begin Holy Week, meditating on the sacrifice of Christ Jesus, we take a moment to realize that if we expect Jesus to forgive us, we must be willing to forgive others. I know this is hard, but the scriptures could not be clearer. Philippians 2:12-13 encourages us, "Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence but much more now in my absence, work on your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure."
