Prayerfully consider deacon nominations

The nomination of deacons is a special event in the Baptist expression of faith. Following the example of Acts 6, each member is afforded the opportunity

to nominate someone who is an active member, demonstrates a caring heart, and who is full of spiritual wisdom to serve the church and assist in its ministries.

It is both an honor to nominate and to be called out by one's peers to serve. Our grassroots, bottom-up recognition of servant leaders is essential in strengthening our identity as a Baptist church. It is an exercise in looking for where the Spirit of God is working and joining God in that work.

Years ago, a lady in a former church asked me for help in making her nomination for deacons. "It is confusing," she confessed. "It is such an important position in the church, who would you suggest I nominate?" I was pleased that we were having the discussion.

Her intentionality in the matter was refreshing. I knew she was approaching her role prayerfully. Though I could not suggest names for her to write down, I did think of a way to help her discern who she



would identify as a person in whom the Holy Spirit is working.

"Think of it this way," I began, "if you were in the hospital, who would you want to visit you? If the church was facing a challenge, good or bad, whose wisdom would you look for to help make the right decision? If

you had a private prayer request, who would you want to confide in that you knew would listen and keep your concern confidential?

Lastly, when there is an event at church, who do you see regularly? Who hangs around afterwards to help clean up? Who encourages the children and takes time to speak to visitors?"

"Ah," she said, "that helps. I know exactly who I am going to write down." Deacons are servants. The election of deacons, like the servants chosen in Acts 6:1-6, is a very practical and essential matter.

In Acts 6, servants were chosen so that the Apostles could dedicate themselves to the work of prayer, preaching and caring for the spiritual needs of the church. The word deacon means servant. They took on the role of waiting on tables and cleaning up afterwards, seeing that all the members' needs were attended to.

At First Baptist, our deacons serve on var
