Wide Open Spaces call the young

One of the most fertile spaces for spiritual growth is at retreats, camps and mission trips. There is something special about being together with others focused on learning and growing in faith.

While we have many opportunities for learning and growing each week at 411 North Fayetteville Street, those opportunities multiply when on the road. Maybe it's the close proximity with friends old and new.

Maybe it's the challenges you must overcome together like camel crickets and no AC in the worship center. Maybe it's the one-liners that left you in stitches at the end of a long day. Maybe it's getting away from technology and the distraction it brings. Whatever it may be, it is worth the time and challenges to make wide open space for God to work through those who pack up and



hit the road together.

And that's just what we did on Wednesday, June 11, when we loaded up the large church bus with 16 kids and eight chaperones and headed west to Lynchburg, Va. for camp. At PASSPORTkids Camp, we practiced following the

example of Jesus through an active schedule of Bible studies, missions education, recreation and worship.

The theme was "Wide Open Spaces," based on the passage from Psalm 18:19a – God stood me up in wide-open spaces; I stood there saved-surprised to be loved! Throughout the week, the lessons centered on making space for God to work in and through us with focused themes each day that included, Space to Welcome, Space to Reach Out, Space to Act, and Space to Dance. The lessons paralleled Bible stories to support examples of each theme and

pointed to the lives of Foushee family, who serve as missionaries in Japan.

I wish there was enough wide-open space on the calendar to recount every story, every meaningful thing shared by our children, and every example of the incredible servant hearts of our chaperones. What I will share is that our kids daily demonstrated an understanding of the theme, living it out as they grew in relationship to God and one another.

I will share that they showed incredible grace for one another when personality differences threatened to disrupt the peace. And I will share that our chaperones were saints, helping to meet the needs of our diverse group.

But it would not be possible without the gift of the camp theme: Wide Open Spaces. I am grateful for the sacred space of camp to witness the ways God is present in the life of each child and adult. I am grateful for the space our participants carved out in what I know are crazy calendars to make room for God.

I am grateful for the church members who made space to write notes to send with our campers to read while at camp. And I very grateful for our Senior Adult Ministry that made space to provide financial support to offset the costs for our participants and volunteer chaperones. Praise the Lord for what can be accomplished when we create wide open spaces for God to work!
