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God's laws keep creation together

Several months ago, we began an experiment during the Sunday school hour called Echo. Young adults gather with me in the fellowship hall after worship to an-

swer one basic question: What did you hear in the sermon you'd like to talk about.

Sipping coffee, we let the Spirit lead the discussion. We talk about things that we hear during worship. Sometimes we get off track believing that God speaks to all our conversations.

This last Sunday we took a moment to discuss the floods in Texas, wondering why God permits certain disasters to occur. Truthfully, we didn't come up with an answer; these are the things only God knows, but it did lead me to recall a time when I asked my pastor a similar question many years ago.

Mr. Ferrell told me that when God created the heavens and the earth, even before humans were created, God set up laws to hold creation together, to keep it going. To illustrate this, he used the example of the law of gravity.

Without this law, things would float away. Other laws exist too, like those that



dictate weather patterns. There are laws that set the earth in motion and direct the seasons. Another instills in animals the instinct to care for their young, nudge them to walk or fly, and teach them how to survive. These laws provide balance, help to rec-

reate, and sometimes, when we get in their way, they can cause disaster.

My pastor taught me that these laws are good because God made them to protect and keep creation going. There is order in creation. God made it that way.

When we plant tomato seeds we grow tomatoes not squash. When heated to 212 degrees Fahrenheit, water boils. And when a tropical depression forms over warm water, a hurricane can form. When the steering currents in the upper atmosphere move a certain way, storms are carried along like a boat in a river. All of this is a part of God's creative design.

His explanation continues to make sense to me. The laws of nature are there to provide security. Looking at the Commandments, the Beatitudes, Jesus' teachings, I see the same thing. God has given these to us to protect us and keep us safe. God gave us these instructions to sustain us in our re

Normally children are taken to child welfare services to await placement in a foster home. This can take several hours, but sometimes it takes many days. These children are often scared, lonely and hungry and often have nothing but the clothes on their back.

The Isaiah House is a safe place with friendly and loving volunteers who provide

clean clothes, toys, warm blankets, care and love. Their mission is to reduce trauma for children awaiting placement in a foster home, lighten the load for child welfare services and ease the transition for foster families.

The WMU will be collecting school supplies to be distributed to children/families in need at the August 5 meeting. Donated items may be placed in totes that will be at the dinner. Donation totes will also be located outside the church office.

Midyear update from Budget and Finance

The first six months of 2025 are behind us. To date, General Fund revenues have exceeded expenses by \$42,046. That's good news. Give credit to the staff and committee leaders for their prudence in spending the church's dollars.

Giving to the General Fund, however, is far short of the Budget the church body adopted for 2025. As of June 30, General Fund giving totaled \$396,504. The Budget is \$433,126 so midyear, we're \$36,630 short of our giving goal. On a positive note, giving in the month of June was



more than it's been in five years. Also giving over the first half of 2025 exceeded giving during the same period in 2024.

With help from Tommy Bedford and Samara Batts on the Financial Administrative team, the Budget and Finance Committee has been working to streamline and improve our accounting system by combining several bank accounts into an interest-bearing account. Also, several restricted funds that have not been active in many years have been cleaned up.

The goal of these steps is to provide more transparency and to make the monthly financial report more easily understandable for church members.
