New Wednesday night format, 30-30-30, begins on September 10

In the fall, the church will try a new format for Wednesday nights in the form of 30-30-30 Nights. The format of the night is meant to revitalize Wednesday night participation and help us be intentional about loving God through a time of collective worship (30 minutes), loving self through learning (30 minutes), and loving others through fellowship and missions activities (30 minutes).

During the first 30 minutes of the night from 6-6:30 p.m., we will have a time of collective worship in the Sanctuary with praise and worship music, prayer, and a moment of response to how God is working in our lives.

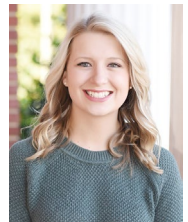
The next 30 minutes, 6:30-7 p.m., will focus on learning. Our children and youth will participate in their age-appropriate lessons planned by their leaders. Adults will have at least three options for study with one being a focus for young adults and parents. More details will come out in the coming weeks about these studies.

The final 30 minutes, 7-7:30 p.m., will be a time for activities. Ministries in the church are invited to schedule and advertise activ-

ities for this time each Wednesday night for church attendees to put into practice loving our neighbors. A few activities that are already being planned is a “Walking Club,” a group who will walk around the church and fellowship through conversation and exercise as a way to foster relationships with other believers. Another activity is a dedicated time to prayer as we seek to love through praying for our neighbors. Handbells will rehearse during this time as they love others by serving the worshipping community through music.

As we enter into this new Wednesday night format, we do so knowing that there will be some hiccups along the way. One of those hiccups being that we may not always have a perfect 30 minutes for lessons and activities. One may go over slightly, and that is ok!

The vision for these nights is to practice faithfully and intentionally Jesus’ words on the greatest commandment, ““You shall



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We need Jesus; we need one another

There is a tree behind our house that has been infested with wasps. They aren't normal wasps; they are those yellow striped wasps that tunnel into hollow trees to make their nests. People tell me that they are the kind of wasp that if stung, you may end up going to the hospital.

I first noticed the wasps several weeks ago and proceeded to spray their hole with an insecticide that is supposed to destroy the nest. It didn't work! Two days later, I returned to the tree dressed in a hazmat suit, my skin covered from head to toe, to get close enough to really fill the tree with spray.



I think it only made them mad. I tried stuffing their entrance with a rag; they found another place to burrow in. I bought a can of spray foam insulation and after spraying the insecticide, filled every hole I could find with it.

I have done that twice to no avail. Yesterday, I called an exterminator. It was hard to admit it, but I needed help.

Asking for help is not easy for most of us. From a very early age we learn to say, "I can do it myself!" and it only gets louder and more sophisticated the older we get. One theologian I read years ago said that he believed that the original sin appears in all of us, planting its roots deep in our hearts, the first time we say, "I can do it myself!"

He suggested that when Adam and Eve ate the fruit in the garden, their sin was that they thought they could do something without God. The older I get the more I realize how prideful it is to think we can do things on our own. The longer we live, the more we realize we need help, the more stubborn we can get in asking for it.

Surrendering to Jesus is humbling ourselves and recognizing that we cannot earn salvation on our own. Nothing we can do can earn forgiveness. No matter how hard we try, we can't un-say words we should not have said or undo something we should not have done.

Only by grace can those things be forgiven. Only through faith can we discover the help we need. I can't help but remember 1 John 1:9, "If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Confession must come first. Realizing we are incapable of earning forgiveness on our own and asking Jesus for help is the first step in being forgiven. Realizing and admitting we need each other is the first step in creating a healthy community.

As most of you know by now, I had hip replacement surgery on Thursday, July 31. For me to be healed, to regain my strength, I must ask for help. I can't do this by myself. Each time I ask Cathy for help I will have to humble myself – but if I don't.... Life gives us these lessons. It is one of the ways God designed us to know how much we need God and we need one another. Yes, we should take responsibility for ourselves, but never to the point we act like we don't need Jesus and we don't need each other. The Bible tells us that it is not good for humanity to be alone. We always need God. We always need one another.

The stone the builders rejected, has become the capstone; the Lord has done this, and it is marvelous in our eyes. This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. – Psalm 118:22-24
