Our different gifts bring glory and honor to God

I am fascinated being around hospitals. I love observing the symbiotic relationships between medical disciplines. Watching each area working together in tandem to



bring about healing intrigues me. There are so many different specialties; each complementing the other.

When I was in seminary, I was introduced to the study of knowledge

called epistemology. As a Christian, I have come to believe that all knowledge comes from God. We do not know anything that God has not created/ordained.

Evil can corrupt what God has given us but evil cannot create, only God can create.

Being in the hospital last week and seeing all the different areas of expertise come together to help me get better was a reminder of how God is behind every advancement in medicine.

When I arrived, a nurse trained in preparing me for surgery worked with me. Then a

nurse anesthetist got me ready to see the anesthesiologist. Operating room technicians made the room ready and positioned me for surgery.

While I was under anesthesia my diseased hip was removed and a prosthetic hip installed. Each of these steps were orchestrated by professionals trained to use their gifts to bring about my healing.

I could continue by mentioning the nurses who cared for me after the operation, those who provided nourishment, the physical therapist and occupational therapist who got me up on my feet and taught me how to dress myself. Thinking back on it, I'm reminded of an orchestra sharing their talents to perform a beautiful and complex piece of music.

This is such a wonderful metaphor for the Church. Everyone has a different gift that working together brings glory and honor to Jesus. Sharing our uniqueness helps bring about healing to those who are hurting, companionship to those who are lonely, encouragement to those who are down.

The Apostle Paul spoke of this when he

When I needed someone to teach me precautions when I walked, I didn't need someone who works in admissions to verify my insurance. When I wanted a little ice

cream at midnight, I didn't need my blood pressure checked.

The point I want to make is that each of us has a vital part to play in the successful ministries of First Baptist Church of Clayton.

Everyone is important. God has called us together, equipped us with gifts and abilities, to help bring healing to those who need to know Jesus' love in their life.

Let us work together, sharing our best with each other so that Jesus may be glorified and those who seek him may find peace.
