When "Enough" is enough

Is God enough? Am I enough? Is there enough? If you have not asked yourself any of these questions before, chances are you



will at some point. As much as we may try not to, we fall short.

The Bible is filled with stories of people with similar questions as they stumble through the concept of "enough." Our

children are no exception to this. It might not be worded the same as the questions above, but it comes through comments like, "God didn't answer my prayer," "I'll never get it right," or "I can't share because it's my last one."

September 19-21, eight of our 3rd – 5th graders, along with two awesome chaperones and myself, headed to Camp Kanata for the annual Friends Retreat. It is a weekend I look forward to every year as I partner with children's ministers from the nine participating churches to plan a special time of learning and growing together in fellowship with friends. This year's theme was "Enough."

We began by gathering Friday in opening celebration and worship, remembering God

is enough. God is always with us, wherever we go. Even when we have a hard time recognizing it, even when it seems like our prayers go unanswered, God's presence is with us, and God's presence is enough.

On Saturday morning, through rotations of Bible Study, Missions and Recreation, we studied the story of Moses and the burning bush, remembering that even with his imperfections, Moses was enough to be called by God to lead a rescue mission. In this lesson, each of our participants was reminded he or she is enough, too. To close out on Sunday morning, we looked at the story of Jesus feeding the 5,000, reminding us that there is enough.

Listening to the children respond to the messages demonstrated the timeliness of these reminders. Just as much as we need it, our kids need to be reminded they are enough because of God's love and grace. The kingdom of God is one of abundance, not scarcity.

Because God is enough, we are enough and there is enough. Although we have limits and at times feel impossibly weak, our faith in Christ reminds us that when we are weak, God meets us right where we are: "My grace is enough for you because power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9a) With God, you are enough, friends!
