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Always explore new ways to grow deeper in your faith

As I prepare for my pilgrimage to Iona, Scotland, I am reminded of the importance of looking for God's activity in our lives. The week I will spend there is designed to



help those of us who pilgrim together to focus on God's daily presence.

The mornings will begin with worship and the days will end with worship. Worship will bookend the day; everything

in-between is to be influenced by a good beginning and ending.

In fact, I have read that those who once occupied the monastery did not say "Amen!" at the end of their morning prayers as they believed that the entire day's activities were to be approached as if one was still in prayer. Only at the end of the day would they voice their "Amen!" in thanksgiving for God's continued presence.

We are instructed to travel light, not to bring anything that may take our attention away from God. We'll leave modern conveniences behind. Our diet will be vegetarian with meat served only for dinner on Tuesday night. There are no napkins at Iona, we are asked to bring our own.

There is Wi-Fi but only in limited places. Our focus is supposed to be on God and not on distractions and conveniences. The hope is that the routine of practicing the presence of God in a cloistered environment will help me be more aware of the Holy Spirit's activity in my daily routine.

Years ago, I had an experience on a retreat where no one spoke for 24 hours. In silence we became aware of sounds all around us that we too often miss or take for granted. With no one speaking the birds sounded louder, their songs more beautiful.

When the dinner bell rang, one could hear the note hanging longer in the air. At times we could hear our own heart beating; our breathing sounded louder. When we prayed, we strained to hear the wind of the Spirit blowing in our deep, hidden place where faith dwells.

After just 24 hours, the discipline of silence became a mainstay of my prayer life. It is my hope that what I experience at Iona will enhance my relationship with God.
