This week I am meditating on Psalm 104. It is a beautiful Psalm where the writer takes a long look at the world and praises God for the wonderful way everything fits together.

The psalmist begins, "Bless the Lord, O my soul. O Lord my God, you are very great." Then in the cosmology of their day, stops to see the work of God in the grass of the field, the work of the sun and moon, the way young lions feed at night and then slink off in caves during the day not to harass workers in the field.

Everything fits. God has it all planned from the smallest creeping thing in the ocean to the Leviathan, the monstrous creature that roamed the deep. The Psalm celebrates both the creative wonder of God and the symbiotic rhythm of all creation.

Monday morning, I stood at the window looking out on the backyard with Psalm 104 fresh on my mind. I watched so many varieties of birds taking turns landing on the bird feeder feasting on the seed as well as

scattering bird feed on the ground for other birds and squirrels.

I watched a neighbor's cat slowly slinking along the tree line. Although I could not hear the warning, all the foraging animals scattered leaving the mischievous cat to lose interest wandering off into the woods, looking for a field mouse or something else to be its prey.

God was taking care of them all, giving each their daily bread. The creator of heaven and earth was actively involved. Watching over the sparrows of the field and the bulbs from where the Iris' will soon sprout.

Granting us all an ice storm to allow us to slow down and if we were lucky, watch nature remind us that everything will be alright – God is always with us. It is a lesson we all need, especially now.

Once more I heard the echo of another favorite verse, "Be still and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:10).



## 30/30/30 Lineup: Something for Everyone

There are four new offerings for the second 30 minutes of the Wednesday night 30/30/30 activities. At 6:30 p.m., our staff of pastors and ministers have prepared in-depth studies on topics for people of all-ages.

Dr. Len Keever leads a study of Eugene Peterson's book *A Long Obedience In the Same Direction*. The class will focus on the Psalms of Accent and the difference in being a pilgrim and a tourist as we journey in faith. They meet in the church Conference Room.

Rev. Stephen Nance leads a Bible study called *The Word Made Flesh: Jesus as Revealed in John's Gospel*. His study focuses on Jesus' "sayings" and "signs" that reveal his person, nature, character and mission. They meet in the Basic Sunday School classroom.

Rev. Keeley Tarkington leads a study on the book *"Practicing the Way: Be with Jesus, Become like Jesus, Do as He Did"* by *New York Times Best Selling* author, John Mark Comer.
